Our website features a heartfelt video showcasing the inspiring journey of a refugee family whom we have successfully guided through settlement, and helped integrate into their new environment here in Surrey. Their journey highlights the power of community support and the compassionate services we aim to provide.

Allow me to share the story of another family we are currently assisting. For their privacy and safety, their names have been changed. This family arrived facing many challenges, including language barriers, unfamiliar cultural norms, and the daunting task of rebuilding their lives from scratch

Their journey illustrates the kinds of families we are dedicated to supporting and highlights the increasing need for generosity in all its forms—time, resources, kindness, and advocacy—to help these families thrive.



She found herself in another camp in Nairobi where she met her current husband, Bakari and had two more children.

They faced daily food shortages, lack of clothing, no access to public health care, and no funding for school. It was during their time of crisis that they heard of our work with refugees and reached out to us.

We have been able to provide resources for food, schooling and we are currently working with another organization to help them set up a small business. Currently, they are living in a small home in Nairobi.

Janbee's Story

(NAMES WERE CHANGED TO PROTECT IDENTITY)

Janbee was born in the Congo. Her parents both died when she was in her late teens so one of her uncles decided to stay with her and her brother at their home. Every night her uncle would send her out to the lake to fish.

This insured he could take advantage of her and he sexually abused her repeatedly, threatening to kill her if she told anyone. Eventually she became pregnant and he beat her up so badly that she had a miscarriage.

Janbee fled to Kenya where she lived in a refugee camp. Here she met her first husband, and they had two children. Unfortunately, he was poisoned by an unknown person and died.

With the help of a well-wisher named Owiti, she fled this camp to find a safer place for her and her children. Owiti, however, took advantage of her and she became pregnant.anbee refused Owiti's demand to get an abortion so once again she had to flee.
